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### A word from the Headteacher

#### Dear Parents

Welcome to another issue of Roundabout and the year really does seem to be gathering pace very quickly now. I would like to begin by saying how very proud I am of our Year 2 and Year 6 children for how hard they have been working on their learning as they approach their new style assessments. It would certainly be fair to say that the Department for Education has not made life very straightforward for the children in these year groups. Changes of the magnitude of the ones this year should be well planned and conducted in a timely manner but this has certainly not been the case. Indeed I feel that it is important to inform parents of one error amongst a catalogue of others which has affected our school directly. As part of the new Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling tests, we were instructed to take part in an early trial of the materials in Year 2. Therefore



last week our Year 2 children did these tests, the teachers marked them and got them ready to send off to the Department for Education (DfE). Following the early administration, it came to light that someone at the DfE had accidentally published the live tests on their pre-test materials website in error. Many of the children who sat these early assessments had, therefore, already seen the live tests and this would have also meant that every school that was taking the tests in May would have had a significant advantage. It is because of this that the tests became meaningless and have now been scrapped for this year. Our children however, have had to do them and our teachers have had to mark them which has obviously been very time consuming.

I do not like to use my space in Roundabout to moan. However I do feel here that it is in your best interests to be informed of issues like this. Furthermore, if this had been an isolated example I would not have highlighted it. However, this is one example out of a great many oversights and concerns that have been raised this year across education and I for one can claim to be a little frustrated. Still... onwards and upwards as they say and whatever happens this year I could not have asked our children to have tried any harder, or our staff to have worked any harder.

### .... AND SOME HAVE GREATNESS THRUST UPON THEM!

Those words, written by Shakespeare for Maria in Twelfth Night seem very appropriate in my current circumstance, and hopefully they grabbed your attention!

Before explaining why I chose to start with that quote I would like to congratulate Rachel Thynne and Alex More on their election as parent governors, and welcome them to our governing body. I would also like to thank the parents who were not elected, for putting themselves forward. At a time when many schools are struggling to find governors it is wonderful to know that seven parents were willing to stand for parent governor.

#### Why the quote?

When I retired and was invited to become a governor I was delighted to remain involved with our school. I felt that I had appropriate skills and knowledge that would allow me to contribute to the successful performance of the governing body. Having been a member of both our Premises, Finance & Marketing and Curriculum committees I still believe that I can contribute effectively to the running of our school. In the absence of any other willing volunteer I accepted the role of Vice-chair in the knowledge that we had a strong and committed Chair (Kris Knudsen), who I was happy to support. As Vice-chair I was more than willing to substitute for the Chair when she was unable to attend meetings or there was an issue that needed immediate attention and Kris was unavailable.

However, since the recent parent elections I now find myself in the role of Chair.

To be perfectly honest, whilst I feel I probably possess the required knowledge and skills, I do not believe I have the time to remain a fully competent and effective long term Chair of our Governing Body. The role goes far beyond simply chairing meetings and my numerous other commitments mean that I do not feel I can do justice to the role of Chair.

According to national guidelines, an effective chair of governors:

- works with the headteacher to promote and maintain high standards of educational achievement
- ensures that the governing body sets a clear vision, ethos and strategic direction for the school
- with the governing body holds the headteacher to account for the educational performance of the school and its pupils, and for the performance management of staff
- ensures oversight of finances

The key roles of the chair are seen as: Leading effective governance: giving the governing body a clear lead and direction, ensuring that the governors work as an effective team and understand their accountability and the part they play in the strategic leadership of the school and in driving school improvement.

**Building the team:** attracting governors with the necessary skills and ensuring that tasks are delegated across the governing body so that all members contribute, and feel that their individual skills, knowledge and experience are well used and that the overall workload is shared.

**Relationship with the headteacher**: Being a critical friend by offering support, challenge and encouragement, holding the headteacher to account and ensuring the headteacher's performance management is rigorous and robust; a good comparison is with the role of the chair of a board of trustees who works with the chief executive of an organisation but does not run day-today operations. *Improving your school*: ensuring school improvement is the focus of all policy and strategy and that governor scrutiny, monitoring and challenge reflect school improvement priorities.

*Leading the business*: ensuring that statutory requirements and regulations are met, that the school provides value for money in its use of resources and that governing body business is conducted efficiently and effectively.

The chair plays a crucial role in setting the culture of the governing body and is first among equals, but has no individual power. The governing body is a corporate entity and its power and authority rest with the governing body as a whole. On occasions, the chair may need to take chair's action in an emergency, but any such action must be reported to the whole governing body as soon as possible.

Managing time effectively is important and national guidelines suggest that generally being chair should take up no more than 20 days a year. In reality, it usually requires more than this, particularly if you take into account involvement in appointments, judging competitions, attending assemblies, sports days and other events.

Given all of this you might wonder why anyone would want to take on this role. Thankfully, as with all volunteer roles, there are I am certain, people prepared to give the time and commitment required. For this reason, I have called an Extraordinary General Meeting for the sole purpose of discussing and resolving this issue. Whether one of our existing governors is able and willing, or we have to seek one from outside our current number, I have no doubt that by the time you read this we will have appointed a new Chair.

In the meantime, I can assure you that I and the rest of the governing body will continue to ensure our school provides the fantastic education that we all expect, and of which we are all proud.

A day before the Easter holidays our Year 5 and 6 Tag Rugby squad played in the Dorset County Finals at Oak Academy. Since September the children have had some intense training and tactical preparation to get themselves prepared. ## £100 Allowance

Any child that is entitled to free school meals via pupil premium, (i.e. in receipt of free meals because you are in receipt of benefits), can now claim £100 per school year to use towards costs related to their child's education.
