Children in Year 5 and 6 also have the opportunity to take part in the pyramid choir that will perform collaboratively at the Pyramid Music Festival -

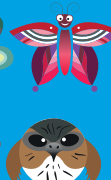

There are changes coming to our Library Service.

On the 7th June Dorset Libraries will be joining the '**LibrariesWest**' consortium. This consortium at present consists of five library authorities but on the 7th June they will be joined by Dorset and Poole library services. What will this mean for us I hear you ask? In Dorset, customers will be able to:

- Keep and use their current library card
- Use over 150 libraries across Libraries West
- Borrow, return and reserve items in any LibrariesWest library
- Access a wide range of stock through a bigger shared catalogue, offering 2.5 million items
- Use the LibrariesWest website and App to search, reserve and renew items 24/7

As part of this change **LibrariesWest** is introducing a new, shared library management computer system and during the transition period there will be times when some services will be restricted.

From the 31st May it will be particularly important to remember to bring your library card to the library in order to help staff with the smooth management of this transition period. 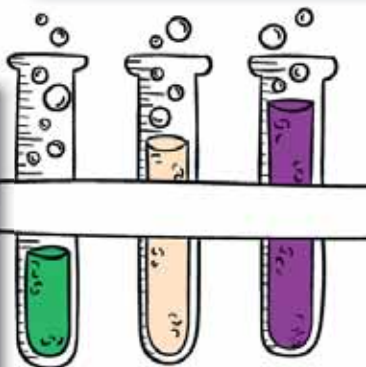

It's time for tee!!

On Thursday 5th May, 10 year 3 students represented the school at a Tri Golf festival held at Ferndown Upper School. There were 9 other teams there and the excitement was high as the children sat waiting for the format to be explained. The local Golf professional called DeeJ was on hand to run the day, ably assisted by sports leaders from Ferndown School.

The scene was set, the challenge issued, score as many points on each station as possible in the 5 minutes allotted. 8 challenges lay before them to test their putting and chipping technique as well as how far or how accurate they could be.

Each team was split in half so two golfers could play at the same time, the children decided to split into a boys team and a girls team, then the total score from both teams would be added together to form our school total for each challenge.

As all the schools walked towards their first challenge, you could hear the children chatting about what the challenge would be and how they would work together as a team. On arrival at the tee the young leaders gave a brief description of the activity before allowing a minutes practice. Then the 10 second warning was shouted and everyone got ready, a hush came over the crowd before the whistle blew to start the challenge.

The children were encouraged to cheer and support their teammates which they did with a great passion. Finally the 5 minute whistle went, the scores were tallied up and written on our team sheet and on we went to the next activity to repeat the procedure again. A quick tactical chat from myself and Mrs Thomas on speed of taking a shot, as well as technique being important

in these challenges, helped our cause, as the quicker you collected your golf ball the more goes your team got!

On we went chipping golf balls over water and sand, putting balls over bumps and mounds, as well as trying to get the ball to roll in grass that was occasionally taller than the ball, but our golfers were fantastic and played every shot with a smile on their face and a determined look in their eye. At one challenge the leaders even commented that our school had some of the best golf swings they had seen all morning! Something we were very proud of.

At the final whistle everyone had the chance to sit down and reflect while all the team scores were added up. A tense wait began as the team names were read out in reverse order and a big success for our Year 3 golfers came when they finished in 4th place overall, even more so when after the event it was announced that the winning team contained a county golfer in their ranks!!

A huge thank you to the parents who offered lifts, without them we couldn't have gone and had a fantastic morning of golf!! Well done all.

On Monday the 9th of May 12 Year 4 children set off for Canford School to take part in a Cricket Festival. and sent to an area of the cricket outfield where we found four activities set up for us to do. We started on a fielding drill and the children had to throw a ball at stumps so working on their throwing accuracy. The children worked hard and did very well at this drill. After 20 minutes the whistle blew and on we went to the bowling drill. The sports leaders instructed the children on over arm bowling and then it was over to the children to practice and practice. The stumps soon began to be hit and a difficult start to the drill soon changed to happy smiling faces



even though the rain had begun to lightly fall. The batting drill followed and all the children enjoyed this the most, they took to hitting the ball off the cricket tee with power passion. The ball was suddenly flying to all parts. Our final skill was fielding again but this time working on catching. The ball was beginning to get thrown higher and further as the catching improved. The final whistle was blown and everyone made their way back to our area for lunch.

After lunch the afternoon session was a non-competitive game, based on

the skills the children had learnt in the morning sessions. Off we went to the allocated pitch and met the school we were playing and the sports leaders who would be umpiring. The coin was tossed and we were put in to bat. Everyone had a bat and myself and Mrs Gould saw some big hits, good running between the wickets and some great team spirit. Then we were fielding and the children began to work out for themselves, where to place fielders to stop the batters scoring, the length to bowl the ball to different batters and how hit the wickets when fielding the ball.

A second game was played where we mixed the two schools up and although the rain came down even heavier the children's smiles never disappeared, they were just having fun playing cricket.

It was a great day had by all and the children were surprised when the cricket coach announced that a former school pupil of LMPS was now playing first class cricket for Hampshire! One student stated, "it makes me so proud to think that someone from our school is now playing professional sport".

To make an application for Free School Meals (FSM), please ring 01305 251000.

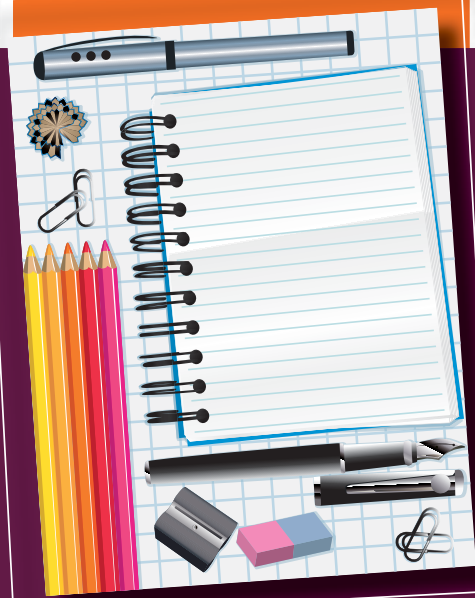
You will be asked your name, date of birth, national insurance number and your child's name, date of birth and address.

If you have any problems, please do not hesitate to contact Mrs Marsh in the school office.

£100 Allowance

Any child that is entitled to free school meals via pupil premium, (i.e. in receipt of free meals because you are in receipt of benefits), can now claim £100 per school year to use towards costs related to their child's education. This funding can be

used for items such as school uniform and educational school trips/experiences like swimming for example. In order for you to claim part or all of your £100 allowance, please speak to the school office, or contact Mr France or Mrs Dominey.
