
Music


Citizens Advice Bureau:

GOVERNORS' CORNER

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Welcome back from a deserved Easter break, it is amazing how this academic year is flying by. April is a month of spring and with spring comes a lot of change. The weather improves for the better (or so one hopes!), and gardens as well as verges and hedgerows fill with new life of blossom, leaves and grass. Birds return from warmer climates and life begins afresh.

It is also the time of year where schools' focus on assessments and SATs can no longer be avoided, as they are perilously close. A challenging time for pupils, parents and staff alike as everyone wants the best for those at the heart of the matter – our children.

The exam time can be stressful, but the school system has to have a means of measuring a child's ability and progress. The controversy is often in relation to how early these measurements of 'conformation' start as well as what should be measured; academic ability or social development? Society expects us all to have abilities on both fronts and schools are in a sense a small 'society' of their own, where both skill sets are learned, tested and developed. It is interesting, therefore, to read the Government's consultation paper 'Primary assessment in England'. The current statutory assessment system of Early **Years Foundation Stage** (EYFS) Profile in reception, Year 1 phonics screening, Key Stage 1 (KS1) and Key Stage 2 (KS2) national curriculum assessment as well as the biennial KS2 science sampling test is what we are familiar with. All of these assessments are carried out to ensure children acquire the

skills to master reading, writing and arithmetic, as defined by set and expected standards for pupils leaving primary education, preparing them for their secondary school education.

The consultation on Primary Assessment began on March 30th this year and is open for parents as well as education staff, authorities and school governors to make their comments. For anyone interested, the complete document can be found on www.gov.uk to read. Scheduled closure of the consultation is June 22nd 2017 at 5pm, and the results are anticipated to be published on the same website by September this year.

Statutory testing does little to formally measure a child's social development. It has been spoken about many times before, how LMPS are proactive and exceptionally good at things outside the classroom, but very recently we

have had strong feedback to back up this observation. LMPS recently received a letter from the family of a former pupil of our school. The purpose of the letter was to say a thank you for the educational experience their child had during their time at LMPS as well as Lytchett Matravers Pre-School. There was clear evidence of the importance of ensuring a positive early educational experience, both within and outside the classroom. This is a child now confidently entering into teenage years – the spring of adulthood.

Fair trade Fortnight!



Do you know at the moment 61 million children in the world are not getting an education?

Year 3 Educational Visit to Stonehenge.

At the end of our Stone Age to Iron Age topic, the children in Year 3 arrived at school early on the 6th of April, excited to be visiting the most well-known prehistoric monument in Europe! When we arrived, half the year headed straight off to the famous stones, while the other half set about discovering what Neolithic life at Stonehenge was like.

First they became archaeologists, exploring Stonehenge through a variety of models and artefacts to answer key questions such as how Stonehenge was built and how we collect evidence to find out what things were like in the past. Then they headed outside to visit Stonehenge's Neolithic village and try their hand at fence-building, rope making and grinding corn, just like our Stone Age ancestors would have done!

After lunch in the glorious sunshine, the groups swapped over and we were lucky enough to be given a tour of the famous stones by one of English Heritage's volunteer experts. Year 2 and 6 SATs Help for Parents

With Year 2 and 6 SATs Weeks rapidly approaching we are all focusing hard on supporting the children and providing them with every opportunity to perform confidently and at their full potential.

Please find below some examples of how to support and help your child before and during SATs week:

- First and foremost, support and reassure your child that there is nothing to worry about and they should always just try their best.
- Talk to your child about what they have learnt at school and what they need to work on to help them improve.

To support with reading you could:

- Talk about the books children are enjoying before, during and afterwards – discussing the plot, the characters, their feelings and actions, how it makes you feel, predict what will happen and encourage your child to have and explain their own opinions.
- All reading is valuable – it doesn't have to be just stories. Reading can involve anything: fiction, non-fiction, poetry, newspapers, magazines, football programmes and TV guides.

To support with maths you could:

- Play times tables games.
- Encourage opportunities for telling the time.
- Encourage opportunities for counting coins and money; finding amounts or calculating change when shopping.
- Look for examples of 2D and 3D shapes around the home and name or describe them.
- Identify, weigh or measure quantities and amounts in the kitchen or in recipes.
- Play games involving numbers or logic, such as dominoes, card games, darts, draughts and chess.

In addition to the ideas above, each child already has a pack of support materials to help them to practice the types of questions they will be asked.

Most importantly, we would just like to say how proud we are of all of our children. We know how hard they have worked, but there is something very important the children should know:

- The SATs do not assess what makes each of you special and unique. The people, who create these tests and score them, do not know each of you the way that we do and certainly not the way your families do.
- They do not know that some of you love to sing in our choir with Miss Wells, or play music in our wonderful orchestra conducted by Mrs Blake. They do not know

that you are a dedicated sportsperson, always giving 110% on the courts or field, representing our school at tournaments, always putting your team-mates first.

- The people writing these exams do not know that your friends can always count on you to be there for them, that your smile can brighten any teacher's day, or that you have a mischievous twinkle in your eye when you're having fun!
- They do not know that you 'give everything a go', wonder about the future or sometimes help our younger pupils in the playground or your little brothers and sisters after school.
- They do not know that you are kind, trustworthy and thoughtful. Trying your very best every day.

The scores that you achieve in these tests will tell you something, but they will not tell you everything. There are many ways of being clever and you should know that you are. So whilst you are preparing for these exams and 'getting through' SATs week, remember that there is no way to 'test' all of the amazing things that make you the wonderful person that you are.

To make an application for Free School Meals (FSM), please ring 01305 251000.


You will be asked your name, date of birth, national insurance number and your child's name, date of birth and address.
